# A Message from Pastor Karen

Kindergarten would seem like sheer fantasy to mod ern day students compared to when I was a stu dent... Every morning, I would stand with my class mates, reciting the Twenty-third Psalm or another favorite story from the Scriptures and the Pledge of Allegiance... Concluding our ritual, we sang



either a patriotic song or the Doxology... "Praise God from whom all blessings flow..." We loved our time together... and we all felt like we were bigger and stronger because we stood up for God and country ... just like our moms and dads.

Like I said, my memories would seem like fantasy to modern day students.

Even at those tender ages, we were taught that it was an honor to know that we stood up for something more important than lunch and recess. We had a duty to parents, school, God and country to do our best, because other people were counting on us to be successful at school.

If schools no longer have the legal privilege of starting each day with prayer, then churches need to step up to the challenge. We need to proclaim God's love—wherever and whenever we can. Our collective voices can make a difference.

Take the Pledge of Allegiance, for example:

It is a curious fact of trivia that God is a fairly modern addition to the Pledge of Allegiance, placed there through the initiative of a small group of Christians who also happened to be patriots.

The original Pledge, which was first spoken publicly spoken on Columbus Day, 1893 made no mention of God. It took a religious fraternity - The Knights of Columbus - to petition the US government to officially add the words "under God" after the words "one nation". The adoption of this resolve was an immediate success.

Before long, their edited version of the pledge was made official by President Eisenhower on Flag Day, June 14, 1954.

On August 17, 1954, President Eisenhower, in recognition of the initiative of the Knights of Columbus on behalf of the Pledge of Allegiance, said: "We are particularly thankful to you for your part in the movement to have the words 'under God' added to our Pledge of Allegiance."

"These words will remind Americans that despite our great physical strength we must remain humble. They will help us to keep constantly in our minds and

hearts the spiritual and moral principles which alone give dignity to man, and upon which our way of life is founded. For the contribution which your organization has made to this cause, we must be genuinely grateful."



The commitment of the Knights is just one more example of the power of a small group of people to change the world for the better. Margaret Mead would agree, she writes: "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed, citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."

Too often we moan about our helplessness to publicly stand up for Jesus. We want to be politically correct and socially acceptable. Brothers and sisters, our commitment to Christ through word and deed can and does make a difference. So Christians, take courage; do not be afraid! Stand up for Jesus. You never know when your witness may completely turn someone's life around... or even change the world!

As you exercise your freedom of speech, you can give God the glory for the abundance with which he has blessed us. Just don't be obnoxious about your approach. After-all, other people have the same freedoms of expression and thought as you do.

# Council Recap-August 8, 2023



# Green Corner NWPA Synod Green Team

Fall is an excellent time to plant trees, and it's also a good time to rescue smaller tree and shrub seedling volunteers like oaks and maples now sprouting in various flower beds and waste areas all around us.

This project can be free or very inexpensive if you plant nuts and seeds to increase the amount of veg-



etation around you and provide food for wildlife. Do ask homeowners before you uproot seedlings in flowerbeds other than your own. Or you can purchase seedlings or larger trees to plant. God helps us with the watering in fall and winter.

If you have concerns about plants being dry, don't hesitate to get out there and water them. Always use the best soil you can, and that may mean that soil at the surface should go into the hole with the roots. Always use something as mulch, to hold moisture in the soil while trying not to touch the little tree with mulch. I even recycle old clothes as mulch, as long as the tree is in an established garden bed, absolutely not where a lawnmower would touch the fabric. That's an instant tragedy! Mowed grass is an excellent free mulch and improves soil as well.

Protect the new seedlings from chewing animals. I cage all new trees until leaves and small branches are taller than me, beyond where deer can reach. It's amazing how fast trees grow, some far more than a foot a year! Planting trees around houses can lower temperatures in the yard and in the house as well, if they are properly sited. I have whole house air conditioning but have had no need to use it for years. The trees make the difference. Do some research, looking for what conditions your seedlings will need-sun or shade, dry or damp conditions.

Conifer trees and shrubs on the north and northwest side of a house block cold winter winds and help to cool the area around them in summer. Deciduous summer shade trees should be planted on the west or east side of houses (mine are on the west).

When the leaves fall, the sun can help heat the house in the winter. Reuse your leaves as mulch to feed the soil. Consider planting trees back far enough from houses to remove concerns of adult trees falling on houses.

After living here 46 years, most of the thousands of trees I've planted are adult now. But I plant trees and nuts every year. It is a true blessing to feel the difference in air temperature and wind currents these trees make now, both in and out of the house. Please, be a blessing to God's world and plant for our future.

# September Gospels at a Glance

September 24 - Matthew 16:21-28 "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me..." FOCUS: There Must Be Another Way Peter may be the "rock" on which Christ will build the church (Matt. 16:18), but when Jesus reveals the suffering that will come first, Peter becomes a tempter and "stumbling block." Assuming God must have a different way to save the world, Peter protests Jesus' suffering and death. Jesus explains to Peter and all his disciples that, in fact, this is the way to life—losing one's life in order to find it.

But while "saving one's life" sounds sensible, those things also stand in the way of the new life into which Jesus beckons us to follow him. Perhaps Peter's problem is that he sees only the suffering and death, without grasping the new life that comes through it. In times when we too are tempted by worldly ways of comfort and success, convinced that surely God must have an easier way than the way of self-giving love, this gospel reminds us that resurrection and life await on the other side of suffering and death.

September 10 – Matthew 18:15-20"where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them"

FOCUS: JESUS IS FOUND IN COMMUNITY... God has not abandoned us - Christ's resurrection and ascension are a beginning for us, not an end. The readings this week focus on the practical work of the gathered Christian community: turning from sin to repentance, from conflict to reconciliation. How do we live together, work together, as the body of Christ? We have been saved by grace, liberated by God's love to love one another. What does it mean for us to clothe ourselves in love?

We keep asking these questions because the way we gather as Christians continues to be profoundly counter-cultural. We do not gather as a social club. If church is only a social club, there is no reason to do the hard work of reconciliation and forgiveness.

God calls us into community knowing that being in community is hard. In scripture we can find practical guidance for gathering through good and hard times. The Holy Spirit is always at work—in, through, and among us—to gather and regather us again. In community we meet and become Christ's body in ways that are impos-

sible for us as individuals; the commandments are fulfilled in this call to neighbor-love.

September 17 – Matthew 18:21-35 "if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive?" FOCUS: FORGIVE & RECONCILE... Today we remember the good news that God's forgiveness is not based on our idea of fairness, but rather on abundant, unimaginable grace. God "does not deal with us according to our sins, nor repay us according to our iniquities" The king forgives our entire debt, no matter how enormous it is. In turn, we are challenged to forgive each other. We must learn to stop keeping score, which is not an easy thing to do. God's forgiveness is much greater than what is fair, what we deserve.

So what does this new, broadened perspective look like in the lives of Christians and congregations? If all are truly welcomed by God, we are called to share the good news of that welcome in all we say and do with one another.

September 24 – Matthew 20:1-16 "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard." FOCUS: GRACE! The laborers who came in the early morning hours grumbled against the landowner because they were paid the same as others who started later and worked fewer hours. These laborers are ill-at-ease with the landowner's choice "to give to this last the same as I give to you." They are uncomfortable with the unchecked mercy offered by the landowner/God. God doesn't play by our rules, and that can be very discomforting for us all.

Our discomfort with grace shows itself in all sorts of ways. It can be uncomfortable for us to engage the poor and the outcast of our society. It can be uncomfortable for us to welcome immigrants into our communities. It can be uncomfortable to address the racism that still surrounds us. And it can be very uncomfortable for us to open our lives to the transforming power of the cross of Christ, whereby "the last will be first, and the first will be last" (Matt. 20:16).

Could it be that the more uncomfortable we become with the reckless love of God, the closer we are to understanding the meaning of grace?
